

Iran Attacks US Navy Ships in the Strait of Hormuz — Wall Street Futures Hold Their Ground

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- The United Arab Emirates separately reported that its air defences were actively intercepting missile and drone attacks on UAE territory — a sign that the overnight exchange involved more than just the US and Iran directly.

- President Trump told reporters on Friday morning that the ceasefire with Iran remains in effect. Markets responded to that statement by holding steady rather than selling off — a remarkable show of resilience given the scale of the overnight military exchanges.

- US equity futures are up across the board despite the news: S&P 500 futures are gaining 0.5%, Nasdaq 100 futures are up 0.63%, and Dow futures are adding 0.3% — while European shares are declining by 0.7% to 1.0% as that region prices in the energy risk more directly.

S&P 500 Near 7,374 at the Open — Resilience in the Face of Hormuz Tensions

The S&P 500 is trading near 7,374 in pre-market activity, up approximately 0.5% and close to the record highs set earlier this week. The index has now held above 7,300 for five consecutive sessions — a level that would have seemed impossible just three months ago before the Iran peace process began.

The Nasdaq 100 is the session's outperformer, up 0.63% to approximately 28,743. Technology and artificial intelligence stocks continue to attract buyers, with the sector largely insulated from the oil and geopolitical pressures that weigh more heavily on industrial and energy names.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average is up 0.3% to approximately 49,746 — within striking distance of the 50,000 milestone that has served as a psychological target throughout this week. Industrial and energy-exposed companies in the Dow are more directly affected by oil price swings than the broader technology leaders driving the S&P and Nasdaq higher.

European markets are diverging sharply from the US. Britain's FTSE 100 is down 0.7%, Germany's DAX is down 1.0%, and France's CAC 40 is off 0.8% — reflecting Europe's greater direct exposure to Middle East energy disruption. Asian markets closed mixed overnight, with Tokyo's Nikkei slipping 0.2% after Thursday's all-time high, while South

CONCLUSION: The gap between US and European equity performance this morning tells an important story. The US market is pricing in the belief that the ceasefire will hold and that the overnight military exchange was a limited incident within a broader diplomatic framework. Europe, which depends more heavily on Middle East energy flows, is less willing to take that bet. The April jobs report, due at 8:30 AM ET, is the catalyst that will determine whether the US market's optimism is rewarded or tested.

April Jobs Report Due Now — What the Numbers Mean for You

CONCLUSION: The 8:30 AM ET jobs data is the pivot point for Friday's session. The pre-market conditions — equities resilient, gold elevated, oil volatile — reflect a market that is waiting, not acting. A strong jobs report confirms that the US economy is weathering the geopolitical storm. A weak one raises the question of whether the damage is only beginning to show.

Oil Spikes Then Retreats — Gold and Silver Gain as Hormuz Fears Revive

1 Brent Crude at \$99.84 per barrel — recovering from overnight spike

Oil briefly surged to \$100.73 per barrel when news of the Strait of Hormuz attacks broke overnight — the first time it had crossed \$100 since the ceasefire hopes took hold earlier this week. It has since retreated to \$99.84, suggesting markets believe the ceasefire framework remains broadly intact. For context, Brent crude was approximately \$70 per barrel before the Iran war began in late February. Even with this week's decline — down around 6% overall — prices remain significantly elevated by pre-crisis standards.

2 WTI Crude at \$94.34 per barrel — volatile but off the highs

US domestic crude has followed Brent's intraday pattern — spiking on the attack headlines and retreating as Trump's "ceasefire still in effect" statement was published. WTI is down about 0.5% on the day. The Strait of Hormuz is the chokepoint to watch: if it remains effectively closed or dangerous to transit, energy prices will stay elevated regardless of diplomatic statements. If a formal reopening agreement is reached, WTI could fall meaningfully toward the \$85-90 range.

3 Gold at \$4,720 per ounce — safe-haven demand is back

Gold is gaining 0.71% at the US open, reversing some of the safe-haven premium that had begun to unwind yesterday on ceasefire optimism. When military exchanges happen in strategic waterways, gold tends to attract buying regardless of the broader market tone. The metal is testing resistance near \$4,750 — a break above that level on sustained geopolitical fear could open the door to the \$4,800 range.

4 Bitcoin near \$79,350 — watching the equity market for direction

Bitcoin has been trading water below the important \$80,000 level for the past two days, having briefly touched \$82,000 earlier this week. Crypto assets tend to follow equities in periods of genuine risk uncertainty — when stocks sell off on fear, Bitcoin tends to follow. Conversely, if the NFP data is strong and equities rally, Bitcoin is likely to reclaim ground above \$80,000. The \$78,000-\$79,000 zone is the key support level to watch on the downside.

CONCLUSION: The commodity picture at Friday's open reflects a market in genuine tension. Oil spiked and retreated — that intraday pattern tells you that traders do not have conviction in either direction. Gold is quietly gaining, reflecting the view that the geopolitical risk has not gone away even if it has not escalated dramatically. The jobs report in the next few minutes will determine whether today's session is ultimately defined by the Hormuz headline or by the underlying strength (or weakness) of the US economy.

CONCLUSION: Friday's US open is one of the more genuinely uncertain session starts of the past several weeks. The Strait of Hormuz is an active theatre of conflict. The April jobs report is about to be released. The ceasefire is officially "intact" but practically under stress. What is most notable is the behaviour of US equity futures — up across the board despite everything. That resilience either reflects genuine confidence in the economic and diplomatic outlook, or it reflects a market that is about to be tested by data that tells a different story. In the next 30 minutes, we will know which.
